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


There is much uncertainty in the prediction of rainfall for much of the Lesser Antilles this season; 'October to December 2016'. However, the forecast is that, rainfall totals are likely to be above-normal or normal. The normal rainfall for St. Maarten ranges from 307.2 mm –499.3 mm/12-20in.


October and November are usually the wettest months of the year, as a result, there is usually frequent showers some of which may be heavy. In December, showers begin decreasing as transition into the dry season begins. There is however high confidence that temperature for most of the Caribbean will be above normal along with high humidity. This means it may feel exceedingly hot until the end of October.

During mid-September, sea surface temperature anomalies across the Pacific Ocean remained near a weak La Nina threshold. Models indicate a weak La Nina will continue until February 2017 and then weaken further to a cool-neutral phase by March.

The 2016 Atlantic Hurricane Season continued with five named storms one of which became a major hurricane during the month of September: Ian, Julia, Karl, Lisa and Hurricane Matthew, which claimed many lives in Haiti.


With two months left in the hurricane season we should **NOT** let our guards down **BUT** remain vigilant and prepared.





Please note that all data was recorded at the Princess Juliana International Airport and may not necessarily reflect conditions at other points on country St Maarten.

Rainfall for the month of September was within the normal range. A total of 103.6 mm/4.1 inches were recorded. There were thirteen (13) days of rainfall four (4), of which were heavy. However, rainfall for the year so far remains below-normal. A few tropical waves and tropical Depression Karl which passed more than 300 miles northeast of the area contributed to the increased rainfall in September.

The normal rainfall for September ranges from 94.9 – 132.7mm/4-5 in.

The Maximum temperature during the month of September was above-normal while minimum temperature was below-normal.

The warmest day was the 3<sup>rd</sup> with an average temperature of 29.9°C/86°F.

The days with the most sunshine hours were the  $16^{th}$ ,  $18^{th}$  &  $24^{th}$  (10hrs :30 min).

The day with the least sunshine hours was the  $5^{th}$  (0 hr: 00 min). Skies were overcast for the entire day.

The windiest day was the  $28^{th}$ , with a daily average wind speed of 17 kts. / 20 mph.

Skies were Partly cloudy to Cloudy during the month of September.
